Boddington managed to get around the Show with a little help from his friend Tony.




He was helping in the marquee at one stage but we made him leave as we didn't want him getting scolded with the hot dogs.

Some of the many physical activities included Giant inflatable slides, KMX (3 wheeled) and BMX bike courses, Zip wires, tunnelling, archery, crate stack, climbing and abseiling and Joey Racing which involved B Pack leader Graham racing the cubs in sacks, bouncing to the finish line. World Scout Jamboree

For those who don't know a World Scout Jamboree is a gathering of Scouts and Guides from all over the world for an exciting of programme global development, peace, cultural understanding, adventure, friendship and fun. The next Jamboree will take place in the summer of 2015, when tens of thousands of Scouts from around the world will gather in Japan for the experience of a lifetime! The theme of the Jamboree will be 'Wa', which has many meanings including harmony, unity, friendship and peace.

The WSJ will be based in Kirara-hama, Yamaguchi City, Yamaguchi Prefecture, Japan from 28th July to 8th August 2015. You need to be born between 28th July 1997 and 27th July 2001 to be eligible. The overall trip is 3 weeks including a short stay in Tokyo. This will allow participants to immerse themselves in the cultural aspect of the city and a Home hospitality (HoHo) experience allowing them to knowledge and gain how understanding of Japanese families live and socialise.

An information evening will be held on 6th November 2013 at 7.30pm at Radcliffe on Trent Scout Hall. There will be a presentation to parents and young people about the entire Jamboree including the Experience, cost and fundraising to help meet the cost (the total cost per person is $\pounds 2,995.00$). A selection day will be held on Sunday 17th November 2013 at Tollerton Scout Hall 10am - 3.30pm.
